#### **Dear Friends and Donors**



**2024** marked a major turning point for Fair Future: we celebrated our 15th anniversary. Fifteen years of existence for a Swiss medical foundation that is independent, tax-exempt, and recognised as a <u>public utility</u> is already an exceptional achievement.

What makes our story unique is that we have managed to remain deeply human, modest, and innovative, with a total commitment to the field.

Here, in the far east of Indonesia, I am on the ground every day. And at the start of 2025, I am more worried than ever. A new crisis is taking hold, one involving social, health, and educational issues. It is the result of new national policies implemented by President Prabowo, which are weakening already exhausted public systems. Simultaneously, worldwide, American humanitarian funding—particularly that of USAID—is collapsing under the pressure of drastic cuts made by the Trump administration.

The consequences of these decisions are tragic: less healthcare, less education, more poverty, and more deaths. Here, we see it every day. Children are falling ill. Medicines are in short supply. Schools are closing or no longer receiving support. And all this occurs in almost complete silence.

And yet, despite everything, **2024** has also reminded me that light sometimes emerges from chaos. I see this resilience in our team and in those we assist. The Laindatang borehole, which lasted **nine months and failed** due to geological constraints, was **the most difficult** challenge of my life. But we did not give up. We designed an even more ambitious project: a 115 m³ reservoir capable of providing water to hundreds of people. This is what we do: transforming the impossible into solutions.

I have been doing this **for sixteen years**, without pay, without comfort, with my only wealth being the dignity we restore to others. Every smile, every child reading under a SolarBuddy lamp, every woman discovering her strength, every healing, every drop of clean water—that is my reward. That is Fair Future. And I will carry on, whatever the cost.



Our foundation is distinctive. **Between 93% and 95%** of all funds we receive are invested directly on the ground. There are no Swiss employees. Our only compensation comes from Indonesians employed locally, providing them with an income, skills, and renewed dignity. We collaborate **with them, for them**, never in their place. Here, every pound donated is a pound that changes a life.

I want to thank nearly **100 volunteers** who, in 2024, devoted their time, energy, and heart. Thanks to our social, economic, political, and local partners, without whom we could not achieve anything. We also extend our gratitude to the communities, villages, men, women, and children **who trust us, welcome us, and work alongside us**—a huge thank you **to our donors**. You are the reason we will still be here at the end of 2024, and we look forward to many more years to come.

In 2025, we face significant challenges. We have postponed <u>ZEWO</u> certification until this year, which is crucial for building trust and transparency with our Swiss and international donors. It is now in progress. We must also prepare for the construction of our new medical-social centre here in East Sumba, as Rumah Kambera will no longer be able to accommodate us forever. We will continue the fight against malaria, tuberculosis, and dengue fever, and continue to provide water, light, healthcare, and education. We will seek ways to move mountains. Because, yes, we know how to move mountains... but we need levers.

**To all of you reading this**: stay with us. Together, we can save lives, make healthcare accessible, offer dignity, and inspire hope in villages where no one has gone before. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts.

## ABOUT FAIR FUTURE

Founded in Switzerland in 2008 (after two years of operation since 2006), Fair Future is an independent, tax-exempt, and publicly recognised medical and social organisation. For 15 years, we have been working in some of the most remote regions, notably in East Sumba, Indonesia, to provide health, water, education, and dignity.

**We are a unique organisation**. We go where no one else goes, implementing the projects we design ourselves, on the ground. Not a single franc is wasted on unnecessary bureaucracy.

**Between 93 and 95**% of the funds received are invested directly in the field. There are no Swiss employees. All our Swiss members, including Alex, work **voluntarily**. Only Indonesian employees are paid, to strengthen the local economy and ensure the sustainability of our work.

### Today, Fair Future consists of:

- Over **100 volunteers**, mainly local, are working on the ground every day.
- Various programmes include <u>Primary Medical Care</u>, <u>malaria prevention</u>, access <u>to clean water</u>, <u>nutrition</u>, <u>health education</u>, and <u>community empowerment</u>.
- <u>Rumah Kambera</u>, our medical and social base camp in East Sumba, serves as a hub of ideas and practical solutions.
- <u>Kawan Baik Indonesia</u>, a partner and sister foundation established **in 2019**, with whom we collaborate fully.

Fair Future also has a headquarters and office in Denpasar, called **Rumah Baik** ("the good house"). This is where administrative management, accounting, data preparation, as well as media and logistics workshops are conducted. This office is shared with our partner <u>Kawan Baik Indonesia</u>, thereby enhancing our **synergies** and **efficiency**.

## CONTEXT 2024 – HUMANITARIAN AND MEDICAL SITUATION IN INDONESIA

In the far east of Indonesia, where we work, are some of the poorest regions in the world. Everything here costs **more than it does elsewhere**: materials, transportation, and food. Yet, access to water, electricity, or healthcare **is virtually non-existent**.

Less than half the population has clean water, and nearly **65% of children** suffer from severe malnutrition. More than **120 villages and 100 schools** are still without electricity, which is why we run the SolarBuddy programme.

Diseases linked to poverty—malaria, polio, leprosy, tuberculosis—remain very common. Waingapu Hospital, serving approximately **700,000 residents**, is severely underfunded: it has no running (or clean) water, limited medical equipment, and poor hygiene.

Local health centres (*Puskesmas*) struggle to recruit doctors because living conditions are too harsh. Most operate **only 12 hours** a day.

Finally, drought worsens the crisis. Water exists underground, but at depths inaccessible without drilling, hence our commitment to making it accessible.

**The greatest epidemic here is poverty itself**. It fuels disease, hunger, and suffering. In 2024, Fair Future remains the **only foreign NGO** present in this region. We refuse to abandon these forgotten populations.

## 01 - PRIMARY MEDICAL CARE PROGRAM

In 2024, our **Primary Medical Care** programme continued to expand, affirming its uniqueness worldwide.

In areas where access to healthcare is non-existent—lacking doctors, medical centres, or medicines—we trained and deployed 21 Kawan Sehat health workers, members of local communities, with no prior medical training beyond their humanity and dedication.

This year, **two training sessions**, spread **over six days** and covering <u>two new modules</u>, were organised. These sessions incorporated the use of <u>nine educational posters</u> designed by the Foundation between 2023 and 2024, focusing on prevention, hygiene, infectious diseases, and first aid.

Thanks to their dedication and the resources available to them, these agents cared for an average of **800 patients each month** in 2024, providing thousands of people with vital care, medical advice, and preventive services. Their work encompasses a broad spectrum, including wound care, emergency treatment, infectious disease prevention, wound disinfection, health education, and the dissemination of preventive messages in villages.

In 2024, each <u>Kawan Sehat</u> agent received a specially designed **medical backpack** made from recycled fabric, **containing nearly 100 essential items, including** medical instruments (such as blood pressure monitors, anatomical forceps, and suture materials), consumables, antiseptics, bandages, and vital medications. This equipment enables community care in areas where no other medical system is available.

The impact is significant: never before have community members been trained to deliver care at this level, saving hundreds of lives each year and protecting the health of the most vulnerable. In 2024, the programme marked a historic milestone with the beginning of an official partnership with the East Sumba Department of Health, paving the way for official recognition and future growth of this remarkable initiative.





## 02 - WATER CONNECTIONS PROGRAM

In 2024, our <u>Water Connections</u> programme significantly improved living conditions in **Laindatang** and **Hambarita**, two isolated villages lacking water and sanitation facilities. Through dedicated and participatory work, dozens of families gained access to resources vital for their health and dignity.

In Laindatang, we constructed four ferro-cement tanks, each holding 5,300 litres, equipped with a three-stage filtration system. The rainwater collected is now used daily by residents—including our teams, who spent nearly **nine months on the ground in 2024.** 

A key achievement was the installation of six sinks in the village school; for the first time, children experienced running water and learned to wash their hands. This simple act significantly improves health by reducing the spread of infectious diseases.

Five gender-neutral toilet blocks were constructed, providing access to facilities for everyone to wash, shower, and maintain their personal hygiene. These facilities are especially vital for pregnant or menstruating women and help reduce the incidence of malaria, dengue fever, cholera, and polio. A noticeable decline in malaria cases has already been recorded in these areas.


Simultaneously, **Elma**, our dietitian, conducted **nutrition workshops** using local products, supported by our educational materials such as the <u>Fair Future food pyramid</u>. These communal cooking and sharing sessions foster social cohesion and improve family health. Additionally, a community garden was established to encourage self-sufficient food production.

True to our approach, all infrastructure was built in collaboration with the residents. They now oversee its **use**, **maintenance**, and **replication**, embodying our participatory and sustainable methodology.

We also laid **five kilometres** of trenches to connect the water points. These projects fostered exchanges, health education, and solidarity.

## 02 - WATER CONNECTIONS PROGRAM

**2024 also presented a significant challenge**: three boreholes were drilled in Laindatang. Despite nine months of effort, geological difficulties forced us to halt the project. However, this experience, far from being a failure, strengthened our resolve and skills.



We therefore developed an alternative solution: a 115 m³ buried concrete tank, capable of storing 115,000 litres of filtered water, collected from an 80 m² roof. It will ensure access to water during the dry season, which can last up to eight months. This project, already funded, commenced in early 2025.

**Finally, eight new 5,300-litre ferro-cement tanks** will be constructed in eight clusters of houses, benefiting **150 people**. Presented at community meetings, this project received enthusiastic backing from residents and local authorities.

This programme exemplifies Fair Future's mission: to undertake the impossible, where no one else can, so that access to water, hygiene, and health is no longer a privilege but a basic right.

## 03 - KAWAN AGAINST MALARIA PROGRAM

In 2024, our malaria control programme continued its work under a new name: Kawan Against Malaria ("Friends Against Malaria").

We decided to rename the former programme Zero Malaria because, unfortunately, eradicating the disease entirely is not feasible in the short term in our region, where malaria remains **endemic** and where geographic and sanitary conditions make the fight especially challenging.


Once again this year, we distributed **several hundred mosquito** nets in some of the most affected areas of East Sumba. Simultaneously, our teams carried out outreach activities, going **house to house** to explain to residents how to **protect** themselves, how to **reduce** the presence of vector mosquitoes (by eliminating stagnant water, dirt, etc.), and, most importantly, how to **recognise the symptoms** of malaria and respond swiftly.

Our efforts focus on **prevention** and **education**, supported by <u>two specific posters</u> created in 2023, which are now widely displayed in **schools**, **health centres**, and **villages**. These visual tools help disseminate essential messages, particularly in areas where education remains limited. **See the posters here**: <u>Malaria One</u> - <u>Malaria Two</u>.

The impact of this <u>programme</u> is evident not only in the increasing awareness among communities but also through official government statistics, which show a **gradual decline** in malaria cases in the areas **where we operate**, despite recurring peaks during the rainy season.

Our <u>Kawan Sehat agents</u>, trained as part of the Primary <u>Medical Care Programme</u>, play a crucial role in this battle through their prevention initiatives and their ability to conduct rapid screening tests and refer patients.

We recognise that to combat malaria sustainably, we must go further, notably **by expanding IRS** (*Indoor Residual Spraying*) initiatives and ensuring every family has access to treated mosquito nets. However, these interventions are costly, and the resources of the State, much like ours, remain limited.



## 04 - SOLARBUDDY PROGRAM

Since 2020, the <u>SolarBuddy program</u> has been a vital part of Fair Future Foundation's efforts, aiming **to combat darkness** and its severe impacts in the ultra-rural regions where we operate. In East Sumba, <u>over 120 villages and schools</u> still **lack access to electricity** and remain **isolated**, without proper roads, clean water, or medical services.

In 2024, we distributed **300 SolarBuddy** solar lamps **to children** across four schools in these remote areas. These lamps significantly transform their daily routines: enabling children to study after dark—which here begins very early, around 5:30 p.m. to 6 p.m., all year round—fetch water along steep paths, often barefoot, or move safely within their homes, helping to **prevent injuries** at a location where healthcare access is virtually absent.

The dangers of **injury** or **accidents** are numerous in complete darkness, as are the risks posed by **kerosene lamps**, which are harmful to health and often cause household fires.

Each <u>SolarBuddy</u> lamp distribution is more than just a gift; it is a **comprehensive educational** opportunity. We use this moment to share vital messages about hygiene, health, nutritious eating, physical activity, and disease prevention through <u>educational posters</u> and the book <u>'Kawan Sehat</u>,' a specially created comic strip for children.

At the same time, 2024 saw the preparation of a major initiative: the distribution of 2,224 new SolarBuddy lamps, including around thirty SolarBuddy Student models, which are more powerful and suitable for classroom use.

This effort is made possible thanks to the invaluable support of **Rotary International** and **SolarBuddy** in Australia.

## 04 - SOLARBUDDY PROGRAM

Although physical distribution began in 2025, the extensive preparatory work took place throughout 2024:

- Collection of demographic and social data, village by village, family by family, to accurately identify needs and prevent duplication.
- Development of an interactive map listing villages and schools without electricity.
- Negotiations with Indonesian authorities (*Ministries of Finance, Social Affairs, Education, Justice, and Human Rights*) to secure a **full tax exemption** on this humanitarian import, **a first** in Indonesia.
- Development of the SolarBuddy Tracker application, which will enable tracking of each lamp distributed, assessment of its impact, and planning of future distributions starting in 2025.

Thanks to this monumental effort, **thousands of children and their families** will see their daily lives transformed by the beginning of 2025, gaining vital access to **education**, **light**, **security**, and **improved** living conditions.

**This programme fully embodies Fair Future's <u>mission</u>:** to go where no one has gone before and offer tangible solutions to those living in obscurity.


#### The year 2024 marked a significant milestone for our logistics with the acquisition

A new, vital vehicle: the Truck & Load, a new **Isuzu Traga** truck bought in Surabaya, thanks to the generosity of two private donors.



This vehicle was specially designed to accommodate a 1,000-litre water tank, essential for transporting water to isolated villages with no road access, where water is vital for both the residents' survival and our activities, especially during ferro-cement construction.

Although it is a two-wheel-drive vehicle, limited in certain extreme terrains, **the Truck & Load** offers us numerous services: transporting equipment, delivering supplies, and managing logistics routes between Surabaya, Denpasar, and Sumba.



## 05 - TRUCK OF LIFE & TRUCK N'LOAD

For its part, the <u>Truck of Life</u>, our fully medicalised Hilux, continued its missions in 2024, covering just over 10,000 kilometres on often extremely dangerous roads and tracks.

Earlier this year, **the Truck of Life** was involved in a serious accident, falling into a small ravine and sustaining significant damage to its front end.

Thanks to repairs costing nearly **6,000 Swiss francs**, we not only **restored** the vehicle but also **strengthened** its durability with new parts and a reinforced bumper.

The <u>Truck of Life</u> carries all the essential equipment for our medical missions: an ultrasound machine, specialised medical equipment, a complete first aid kit, and a 90-litre refrigerator to preserve vaccines and sensitive medications. Although it now has only two passenger seats, the rear compartment allows, if necessary, for the transportation of emergency patients to a hospital.

This vehicle embodies Fair Future's philosophy perfectly: to go where no one else goes. It delivers care, treatment, information, and comfort to even the most remote villages, where the lack of roads, electricity, or medical services would otherwise condemn thousands of people to isolation and suffering.

**It is much more than just a means of transport**: it is a symbol of our commitment and perseverance, even in the face of the most extreme challenges.

# 06 - COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

In 2024, our <u>empowerment programmes</u> continued to grow and strengthen **across 17 of East Sumba's 22 regions**, led by exceptional women: **our twenty-one** <u>Kawan Sehat health workers</u>, true **superheroes** at the heart of their communities.

Previously limited to their roles as housewives, these women have now become vital pillars of their villages' **social**, **educational**, and **medical** life. Many of them are also **PAUD\*** teachers, which allows them to combine the transmission of academic knowledge with the dissemination of public health messages.

Their knowledge base and responsibilities have increased significantly, thanks in particular to the two new training weeks organised in 2024 as part of the <u>Primary Medical Care</u> Program, which also fully embodies our vision of **women's and community** empowerment.

However, our approach **goes far beyond** women's empowerment alone. We work to empower all communities—**men**, **women**, and **children**—through all our programmes. Every action we undertake —whether medical, social, or infrastructural—is carried out with the community, never without them.

In 2024, we organised **fifteen** <u>healthy nutrition</u> workshops in several regions. These workshops, primarily aimed at women, aim to teach healthy cooking techniques using local resources to **improve** health and **prevent** malnutrition. Mothers actively participate in learning to prepare balanced meals for themselves and their families, incorporating the educational messages conveyed by our <u>posters</u> and <u>teaching materials</u>.

\* PAUDs are preschool centres in Indonesia for children aged 0 to 6, offering basic education, play, nutrition, and light care in villages.





## 06 - COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

**Empowerment also involves sharing technical expertise**. When constructing infrastructure, such as ferrocement tanks, sanitation facilities, and pipe networks, **we collaborate closely** with local residents.

We are not merely builders, doctors, or nurses; we are **guides** and **educators**, instructing local communities on how to build themselves sustainably, economically, and safely, enabling them to replicate these techniques in other villages later.

Our <u>empowerment programmes</u> also tackle more sensitive issues, such as <u>child labour</u>. We raise awareness among communities that children should be in school, not on construction sites or doing domestic chores—a topic that can be **difficult to grasp in rural areas**, but is essential to breaking the cycle of poverty and disease.

Empowerment is a **core theme** of Fair Future. As long as the Foundation exists, we will continue to invest in **developing the skills**, dignity, and resilience of the women and communities we serve.

Because it is there, in the heart of these villages, that a fairer and healthier future is being built.

# 07 - PREVENTION AND HEALTH EDUCATION

At Fair Future, we understand that **education plays a vital role** in combating poverty, disease, and inequality. In 2024, we reinforced our commitment to health **prevention** and **education**, believing these are the most effective ways to save lives and enhance the quality of life in the **remote villages** of far eastern Indonesia.

In these areas, the absence of education is striking: many people are unaware of basic practices related to hygiene, healthy eating, or disease prevention. It's not enough to build toilets or sinks; it's also necessary to teach people how to use them, explain what a faucet is, how to wash their hands, why avoiding contaminated water is important, and which foods promote good health.

These tiny skills make a significant difference, reducing the spread of diseases such as malaria, dengue fever, cholera, tuberculosis, and the plague, which still occur in some of the regions where we operate.

In 2024, we created nine educational posters, including six this year, covering a variety of essential themes:

- Alcohol Abuse Destroys Lives Choose Health and Control
- Litter Kills Stop Pollution and Take Action
- Smoking Harms Everyone Protect Yourself and Others
- Clean Hands, Healthy Life Learn to Wash Your Hands Properly
- The Four Pillars of a Healthy Life Develop Good Habits
- The Fair Future Food Pyramid Eat Well and Stay Healthy
- Healthy vs. Harmful Foods Make Wise Choices
- Recognising Malaria A Guide to Saving Lives
- Preventing Malaria Simple Steps to Stay Safe

In 2024, a **significant innovation** was the shift from paper prints to washable, foldable fabric posters, which are better suited to tropical climates (characterised by rain, heat, and humidity) and rural areas.

These <u>posters</u>, easily transported by our <u>Kawan Sehat</u> <u>agents</u>, create personalised educational moments in homes, fostering an atmosphere conducive to **listening** and **learning**, allowing each topic to be addressed and guestions answered.

Also in 2024, we updated our <u>flagship book</u>, **Kawan Sehat – The Healthy Friend**, a socio-educational <u>publication</u> for all ages that covers **20 themes** and features a new section on the dangers of secondhand smoke.

Available in both Indonesian and <u>English</u>, this book is a valuable resource for our staff, and it is distributed across many villages, schools (<u>PAUD</u>), and public health centres (<u>Puskesmas</u>). It serves as a reference for **health education** for children, families, and local leaders.


Finally, Fair Future enhanced its prevention and education <u>programmes</u> in 2024, firmly believing that knowledge is the strongest weapon against poverty and disease.

## In villages where people do not know how to use a tap or toilet, we have developed:

- Training on hygiene, handwashing, cleanliness, pest control, nutrition, and the fight against tobacco, alcohol, pollution, and junk food.
- Medical training for our <u>Kawan Sehat</u> agents on diseases, medications, and prevention.
- Interventions to resolve local issues, such as stagnant water, livestock pollution, and issues in Siri Pinang.



### The book "Kawan Sehat", the healthy friend, in PDF version in English




## 07 - PREVENTION AND HEALTH EDUCATION

We created <u>nine educational posters</u> made from **tropical-weather-resistant** fabric and updated our <u>Kawan Sehat book</u>. **Our impact is clear**: residents are adopting new habits, gaining a better understanding of health risks, and sharing this knowledge.

### Each advancement represents a triumph against both disease and ignorance.

In 2024, new campaigns are being prepared, especially on sexual health and STIs such as HIV, hepatitis, and syphilis. Health education remains a daily challenge and a fundamental part of our mission.



## 08 - RUMAH KAMBERA

Since 2019, Rumah Kambera has been the nerve centre of Fair Future Foundation in Eastern Indonesia.

This is where everything begins: ideas, construction, training, and meetings. Since 2019, this strategic location has been home to our teams 2024. We have welcomed local authorities, dozens of volunteers, and our international partners, such as **Rotary International**, who have visited **twice** to observe our work in the field (*twice for one week*).

A true solutions workshop, **Rumah Kambera** enables us to design and prefabricate essential infrastructure, including sanitary blocks in kit form, educational materials, meal preparation facilities, a repair workshop, and more.

It is also a vital logistics hub: an expanded pharmacy, storage for hundreds of solar panels, medical equipment, and construction tools.

This year, a new office was established, **air conditioning** was installed for medications, and a **small library** was set up. At the rear, a **community garden** promotes the cultivation of healthy, local food. Simultaneously, we are managing waste **more responsibly**, despite the region lacking a sorting system. Composting, manual sorting, and reducing non-recyclable waste are part of our daily routine.

**Rumah Kambera** is also a place to live. Part of the team resides there for several months each year: Alex, Ayu, Ino, Elthon, Erwin, Susanti, Ni Luh, Wahyu, and many others. The camp's animals —*Kalu, Pedro, Rumba, and Siti*—are also part of this close-knit family.

**However, 2024 was marked by uncertainty**: the owner intends to reclaim the house in the near future. Accordingly, **we are launching a project** for a medical-social centre on land to be acquired. This simple but essential space will house a warehouse, a pharmacy, and a clinic, becoming our sustainable base in East Sumba.

**Rumah Kambera embodies our unique approach**: local, participatory, and humane. It is from here that we will continue to develop practical solutions for those with nothing.

### Testimony of Arniyanti, 14 years old

« My name is **Arniyanti, and I am 14** years old. I had been unwell for a long time. My neck was getting larger and larger. I was in severe pain, weak, and could no longer attend school or play with my friends. I felt ashamed and stayed at home most of the time.

One day, **Ayu** and **Elthon** from Fair Future came to our village with Kawan Sehat agent Veronika. They saw me and spoke to my family. They said they needed to take me to the hospital. I was frightened, but they assured me everything would be alright. They took me to the Kawangu Puskesmas, and then even further. The doctors found that I had a tumour, along with a large sac of fluid. They also diagnosed me with tuberculosis, which I had had for a long time.

I underwent surgery, and the doctors removed the tumour. Now, I am no longer in pain. I feel stronger, I can eat properly, and I can walk. I want to return to school. I am very grateful to the "aunts" of Kawan Sehat and Fair Future. They saved my life.»



### The story of Dani, 14, treated during a community day

«My name is Dani, I'm 14 years old. For several months, I had a large lump under my skin on my side. It hurt, and I was scared. I didn't dare talk about it much.

One day, there was a community care day in my village in <u>Hudumburung</u>. Aunt Veronika, a **Kawan Sehat Health Agent**, saw me and told me I needed treatment. The people from Fair Future and Kawan Baik were there too. They looked at my lump and explained that it probably wasn't serious, but I needed to get to the medical centre quickly.

They called Puskesmas immediately. Normally, it takes a long time to get treatment here, but thanks to them, I was already at the hospital that same evening. The doctors operated on me and removed the large lump. It was a lipoma, fortunately not cancer.

Since then, I've been pain-free, happy, and able to return to school. I am very grateful to Aunt Ruth and Fair Future.»

## Now I have water here at home—and a toilet—for the first time in my life.


« Before, to get a few litres of water, I had to walk very far. Often two hours, sometimes more. And my children helped me. We got up at 4:00 a.m. We also had to relieve ourselves in the bushes or behind the trees. It wasn't clean, neither for us nor for the children.

Now I have a tap in front of the house. We share toilets. It's simple, but it's huge for us.

This is the first time I can say I have clean water. My children go to a school where you built two blocks of toilets and sinks. They walk there every day, sometimes in the rain, for over an hour, but they go with a smile.

Because now they can wash their hands. They can go to the toilet like other children elsewhere." I'm so grateful. My life is better today. »

Since our inception, between <u>93% and 95%</u> of our funds have been <u>directly invested</u> on the ground in concrete and sustainable projects.

The financial data for **fiscal year 2024**, presented below, demonstrates our commitment to complete transparency with our donors, partners, and institutions. They also show our ability to **undertake ambitious projects** while maintaining minimal administrative costs.

We do not pay any Swiss or foreign employees; all salaries and compensation are exclusively provided to Indonesian partners and employees, with the aim of promoting local development and community empowerment.

## OUTLOOK 2025

The year 2025 will be pivotal for Fair Future Foundation. Our focus remains on continuing our vital programmes despite an increasingly uncertain global environment.

Without our loyal partners and donors, we could not sustain our efforts. Behind every franc are thousands of lives that depend on us for access to health, water, light, and dignity.

#### Our outlook for 2025 concentrates on several key priorities:

- Securing the primary Medical Care Programme, our cornerstone, by obtaining the necessary funding for 2025 and 2026, so that our Kawan Sehat agents can keep delivering care and education in their villages.
- Expanding access to clean water and sanitation facilities in three new villages: Lapinu, Lukukamaru, and Hambarita. Projects in Hambarita and Laindatang are funded, but these new areas still await their turn. These are tangible interventions, achievable within a few months, capable of transforming the lives of thousands of families.
- Enhancing the fight against infectious diseases (malaria, tuberculosis, dengue fever, cholera, leprosy) through increased prevention, new educational materials, and field activities. Our aim is to reach more households and save more lives.
- Finding avenues to build our new medical and social headquarters in East Sumba is vital, since Rumah Kambera must be relocated by the end of 2025 or 2026. For approximately 100,000 Swiss francs, we could purchase land and construct a professional, functional centre, entirely designed and built with community involvement.
- Achieving ZEWO certification, now targeted for 2025, to enhance trust and transparency with our donors and partners.
- Raising the number of Kawan Sehat agents from 21 to 30, to extend medical coverage to even more remote areas.

We remain dedicated to operating where others do not venture. Every act of support serves as a catalyst to save lives.
